Before discussing color let's review simple or 'clean' backgrounds. Images with simple backgrounds can be beautiful. Not all photos need to be simple but it's a good place to start.

Find a strong center of interest and get in close enough to fill the frame. Avoid busy backgrounds and don't include too much content in a single photo. If there is a lot you want to capture make more than one photo.


One way to do this, other than using a blank wall is to lower yourself near the ground and use the sky as your background. Assuming the sky isn't too bright it will give you a beautiful, clean blue background making your subject stand out.


I think of K.I.S.S. as: Keep It Simple Susan


Simplicity isn't just removing the superfluous. Simplicity is tackling the complexity of the world around you and trying to distill something to the pure essence.

Framing





Repetition of similar colors or tones






Light
